





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## Tillyer's News of the High Frontier

Despite its unsettled weather, March is a good time to look up. With the recent Lunar Eclipse another eclipse is hot on its heels. Northeast North America will experience a partial Solar Eclipse on March 29<sup>th</sup> from 6:55AM to 7:04AM, Maximum at 6:58AM with a 4.21% coverage of the disc. Those times mean that the Sun will rising and low on the horizon, so in order to properly appreciate the event, you will want to be as high up as possible with clear sight lines to the East. Since it wasn't that long ago that we had another eclipse, some may still have the appropriate view gear. As always and especially since this is a partial eclipse, do your viewing wisely with proper protection to avoid damaging your eyes. This is unfortunately going to be barely visible since only 4.21% of the Solar disc will be covered, but because the Sun will be rising, the lensing effect of the atmosphere, which causes the Sun to appear larger as it rises or sets, may aid in viewing. Finally, this is going to be a really quick one, the speed of the passage of the Moon's shadow in our locale is almost at its maximum. If you would rather look at the night sky than stare at the Sun astronomers believe that another event is on the way. T Coronae Borealis is what's known as the Baze Star and may soon experience an explosion. A recurrent nova, the Blaze Star tends to erupt every 80 years. Previously, astronomers predicted that the event would occur between April and September last year. Subsequent observations indicate that the star may go off this year instead. At this time of the year the constellation of Corona Borealis is rising just after sunset and located between Arturus and Vega. Right now, T Corona Borealis is almost visible with binoculars but after the eruption it will become one of the 200 brightest stars in the sky. The change in magnitude for the star will only last for a few days. But how does this happen and why so regularly? The reality is we are not talking about one star but two. The star which experiences the nova explosion is a white dwarf and its

partner is a red giant. Both of these stars represent different ages and are representative of the ultimate fate of our own Sun. The red giant is the next phase for Sol and the white dwarf its ultimate fate. Since the giant is younger still active, as it expands, it sheds shells of gas which are then deposited onto the white dwarf. The previously quiet star is given a brief new life until it acquires enough gas to touch off a nova. Things settle down afterwards until the cycle begins again, in this case, typically requiring 80 years of accumulation. Eventually, the red giant will lose all of its gases and there will only be two white dwarf stars. We are fortunate to be here at the right time to experience this unique event.
